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While researching a topic for this month's article, I found some interesting points you can make to help recruit Master Masons into the Royal Arch. These points came from an article authored by Companion Howard Little.

The principals of masonry are to make "good men better", and any of us can become better than we are now. The York Rite bodies purpose is to further the Masons education and the Royal Arch and York Rite bodies are a source for that education. The Royal Arch will help fill in with more detail the areas not covered in the three symbolic Degrees.

As noted in Masonic history, the Royal Arch was originally part of the Symbolic Lodge, but as time went on it became a separate and independent body. When this occurred, the Past Master Degree was instituted so that the candidate could become a virtual Past Master, to be able to receive his Royal Arch Degree. Thus the degrees in Royal Arch are the Mark Master, Past Master, Most Excellent Master, and the Royal Arch degree. The Mark Master exemplifies how the craft were paid their wages: in that and all who labored received equal pay. In the Past Master Degree, the candidate learns how to govern a Lodge while he is seated in the oriental chair of King Solomon. The Most Excellent Master Degree portrays what was experienced in the building and completion of the temple. The Royal Arch degree is founded on the building of the second temple, and as in the Mater Mason Degree you received a substitute word until future generations should find out the "right word", which you will find in the Royal Arch Degree.

As you have read, and should already understand, with the above information, an invitation should be extended to each Master Mason who is not already a Royal Arch Mason, an invitation on behalf of your Chapter, to take this time and opportunity to join the ranks.

On another note, please take another moment to nominate someone from your Chapter for either the General Grand Chapter International, or Grand Chapter MSA award. I have sent a copy of the nomination form to at least two people in every Chapter via email. However, many of the emails bounced back. If your Chapter did not receive a copy, please contact me with information on where to email it, and I will do so. The dead line for the MSA is April 1, 2017. You can also download a copy from the Grand Chapter website.

The Grand Chapter, or at least Chapters, of Royal Arch Masons and have been in Michigan been an influential part of the Masonic Tradition in Michigan since April 20, 1818 when Monroe Chapter No. 1 held its first meeting at the Masonic Hall (Benjamin Woodworth's Hotel) in Detroit, Monroe Chapter No. 1 received its Charter on Feb 17, 1821.

Monroe Chapter was instrumental in St. Joseph Valley No. 2 in Niles receiving a dispensation to work. It forwarded the recommendation for a dispensation, along with \$110.00, to the General Grand Chapter on April 16th 1844. The Dispensation was granted on May 16th of that year. Their work being satisfactory, the General Grand Chapter in September 1844 granted the Charter which was made out and dated October 16th, 1844.

Jackson Chapter No. 3 located in Jackson received authority of a warrant to work from the General Grand Chapter and held its first meeting in the Odd Fellows' Hall on the thirty-first day of March 1847. At a regular convocation held on the 2nd day of December 1847, they adopted a resolution, previously approved by Monroe Chapter, declaring that in the opinion of the members of this Chapter, it was expedient and proper to form a Grand Chapter for the State of Michigan. The organization of the Grand Chapter took place in Jackson on the 9th Day of March 1848.

The first elected Officers of the Grand Chapter were: E. Smith Lee, Monroe, Grand High Priest; Czar Jones, Jackson, Dep. Grand High Priest; Nathaniel Pullman, St. Joseph Valley, Grand King; John Mullet, Monroe, Grand Scribe; William Lister, Monroe, Grand Secretary; N.B. Carpenter, Monroe, Grand Treasurer and Jeremiah Moors, Monroe, Grand Marshal. (**The Grand Chapter does not have or elect a Deputy Grand High Priest or a Grand Marshal but it does however have the following elected Officers: Grand Captain of the Host, Grand Principal Sojourner, Grand Royal Arch Captain, Three Grand Masters' of the Veils and a Grand Sentinel.).By the end of the year 1850 Capitular Masonry in Michigan had grown to 7 Chapters and two hundred and fourteen Companions.

The Grand Chapter has continued to grow and prosper since its inception. It has always been a leader in the education and growth of Masonry in Michigan. The last Charter to be issued was presented to Sunlight Chapter No. 189 of Dearborn on October 15, 1975. Sunlight Chapter was founded as a Daylight Chapter. In 1998 it moved its Charter to Garden City.

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March is a Good Time for Spring Cleaning

As winter is winding down it is time to think about spring cleanup, and there is no better place to start than your Council's by-laws. The Council's by-laws are a part of the duty you agree to uphold when taking an office in Council, and more especially are a part of every Thrice Illustrious Master's obligation to preserve during his term of office. Our by-laws are referred to constantly in our obligations and in the charges of our degree so, do you even have them?

Like an IT tech asking you if your device is plugged in and turned on, let us make sure we even have by-laws in place for our Council. It may come as a surprise to many, but almost half of the Councils in the State do not have by-laws on file with the Grand Recorder! Take the time to search them out and make sure they are on file with Grand Council. If you have by-laws, take a good look at what is current and what may be useful to change. Your local Council can define itself in unique ways with its by-laws. It can keep a place for your traditions and special occasions.

For instance, every year there is a flood of dispensation requests wanting changes in meeting dates in order to accommodate Christmas Dinners, open installations, and other needs of the Council. You do not need to have a dispensation if those allowances are built into your by-laws. Take the meeting time requirements, for example. Why not put a provision into your by-laws that allows (provided proper notice is given to the membership) the December meeting to be held a half-hour earlier when an open installation is occurring? The by-laws allow your local Council to carve out a method of operation that serves your Council specifically, rather than the more generic state-level Constitution or other governing regulations. Your Council may still have by-laws that are based on meeting ten times in a year, rather than the newer six times a year requirement. This is the perfect time for a view, a review, and a cleaning up of loose ends in your by-laws.

So, what if you are having a hard time finding a copy? Do not panic, this is a good time to incorporate all of those local customs and traditions so they are official and not just something "we've always done this way." Sample by-laws found in the Purple Book (Council's law book) are just a starting point.

Too often we disregard our rules and regulations for expediency, but that puts us afoul of the law instead of incorporating our style and unique practices into the law by including them in our by-laws. It is March, which gives every Council time to review its by-laws or determine it does not have any and make the changes needed for your Council and have them voted on and approved before the Grand Assembly in August.

Enjoy the Spring and enjoy the Spring cleaning!

DEMOLAY

The Order of DeMolay was founded in 1919 in Kansas City, Missouri. The Order was formed by "Dad" Frank Sherman Land, a prominent Scottish Rite Mason, with nine young men. The youth movement caught fire and quickly spread throughout the state of Missouri and the rest of the country. Originally a high school fraternity, DeMolay today is open to young men between the ages of 12 and 21.

DeMolay came to Michigan in 1921 through the efforts of "Dad" Charles Conover, a prominent Mason and a Past Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masonry, he was also a Past Worthy Grand Patron of the Order of the Eastern Star in Michigan. "Dad" Conover was appointed the Deputy for Michigan by "Dad" Land and DeMolay came to Michigan, with the first Chapter being instituted in Coldwater, Michigan, "Dad" Conover's home town. The next two (2) Chapters were instituted following the railway, Lansing and then Saginaw. All of this occurred within a two week period. Through the efforts of "Dad" Conover DeMolay in Michigan flourished. At its peak in the 1960's there were 101 Chapters scattered all over Michigan, with over 50 Chapters in Southeastern Michigan. "Dad" Conover was the first Executive Officer, which is the head adult, in the jurisdiction of Michigan and developed Michigan State Chapter in 1924. Michigan DeMolay held its first conclave or state meeting in Grand Rapids in 1924. Michigan DeMolay was very prominent in the DeMolay movement, having the very first International Master Councilor when the International Supreme Council was created in 1967, and three International Master Councilors in the first six years of the Supreme Council. There have been four International Master Councilors from Michigan and four International Congress Secretaries. Michigan DeMolay has had three Grand Masters of DeMolay.

In Michigan DeMolay's 95 year history, tens of thousands of young men have passed through Michigan DeMolay. The majority of senior DeMolay join the Masonic fraternity and continue to support the activities and programs of the Order. Many members have gone on to achieve success in their chosen fields of endeavor or in the Masonic Fraternity. Notable members of Michigan DeMolay include actor George Peppard, Dearborn Chapter; Walter Wheeler MWPGM, Grand Rapids Chapter; Ronald Jones, CEO Dawn Foods, Jackson Chapter; and Harold Koch, PWGP 1953 and Executive Officer of DeMolay 1939-42 and 1950-67. Currently, Michigan DeMolay has 14 Chapters, 211 members and several areas expressing interest in forming new Chapters.

INTERNATIONAL ORDER OF RAINBOW FOR GIRLS IN MICHIGAN

One evening in the spring of 1922, the Rev. W. Mark Sexson was asked to make an address before South McAlester Chapter #149, OES. Rev. Sexson had observed the Order of DeMolay and decided there should be such an organization for girls. Rev. Sexson wrote the Ritual the next day. Rev. Sexson was serving as the Pastor of the First Christian Church in McAlester, Oklahoma. Rev. Sexson was a 33° Mason and would in the next few years serve as the Worthy Grand Patron (1925) and the Most Worshipful Grand Master (1928) of Oklahoma.

The International Order of the Rainbow for Girls came to Michigan on June 24, 1923. By 1960, over 80 Assemblies had been instituted in Michigan and membership was at its greatest. Today Michigan Rainbow, as of this writing, has 13 active Assemblies with approximately 100 members.

For many years, Michigan Rainbow did not use the Masonic Apron in their degree work. Mr. Holm Swenson, a Past Most Worshipful Grand Master, reintroduced the Masonic Apron into the Initiation ceremony at our 50th Grand Assembly in 1978. The Rainbow Girls of Michigan were pleased to be able to do their Ritual work in full.

Michigan Rainbow Girls are an active group and full of excitement and good times. They love to do events such as sleepovers, car washes, serving dinners, ice skating, and bowling. February 18th, we had an all-state service/craft project day. The girls made centerpieces for the Masonic Home for Mother's Day and made items to give to the residents as they visit them during our Grand Assembly Session in Alma in June. In March when we have the Exemplification we will also celebrate Christmas! Mother Nature caused us to cancel the Christmas Party twice because of snow storms. While having a good time together, the girls also strive to present our Ritual as beautifully as possible as written by Rev. Sexson.

Michigan Rainbow has the support of the Grand Chapter of Michigan OES, the Grand Lodge of Michigan, the Michigan Masonic Charitable Foundation and all of the appendant bodies of Masonry. The Rainbow Girls are very thankful and appreciative for all of the support from our adult organizations. We welcome your attendance at any of our local or state meetings and activities.
