Communication! We hear about it over and over again. We have heard it time after time, but how many of us know what communication is or how to do it?

Merriam-Webster simply defines communication as: the act or process of using words, sounds, signs or behaviors to express or exchange information or to express your ideas, thoughts, feelings, etc., to someone else; a message that is given to someone by a letter, telephone call, etc. OR the ways of sending information to people by using technology. Sounds simple enough, right?

There are a few objectives to keep in mind when you communicate through the Chapter; First, the purpose for a communication is to increase the level of awareness. Second, reward performance. Third, provide an opportunity to participate by identifying problems and work on their resolution. Forth, build an organizational culture that results in openness, honesty, trust and respect.

All of us know the simplest form of communication, talking to each other. However, how many of us know how to communicate to our members as an organization?

The first thing to understand about communication, is to know what it is you want to communicate; is it just information about the status of the Chapter, the events of the Chapter, or the welfare of an individual? Once you know what you want to communicate, you need to decide the effective what most method communication would be. There are three main methods of communication; Verbal Communication, Written Communication and Non-Verbal, Non-Written Communication.

Verbal communication should be made simple, direct and every word made to count. You should use simple phrases so as not to be misunderstood and avoid fluff by sharpening your sentences and using a quick summation. When verbally communicating in person, you should also use eye contact, body language and a clear voice. Verbal communication can be done person to person, by phone, or as a group discussion. Most importantly, when you are verbally communicating to others as the source of information, know when to stop talking. Talking to much will cause the conversation to become one-sided and the listener to lose interest.

Written communication is often looked upon as an unpleasant chore, however, if you think about it, written communication should be a bit easier since you do not have an audience in front of you, you are alone with .......

your thoughts. To start, put all reference data in a caption and start with the main point and build your communication from there. Write as if you were talking to someone at lunch not writing an essay for college. Get the facts and say what you mean! Use lots of specifics to illustrate your point. If you cannot get all the information you need from the papers on your desk, use the phone to find out more. Use short sentences. The ordinary reader can only take in so many words in one gulp before his eyes come to a brief rest at a period. The same should be practiced when communicating through emails.

Another form of written communication could be considered Social Networking. Online social media is an economical, comprehensive, and responsive way to connect with young professionals. Despite community awareness efforts to march in parades; sell hot dogs at an event; social networking is proving to be among the most successful of strategies to connect potential members with the Craft. By hosting an interactive website, social media page, and other venues, a Chapter can generate online public awareness and press releases; discuss and answer common questions in open forums or blogs; and generally get connected to the 21st century where potential members are in a position to interact and learn about Freemasonry. Today's potential member has limited time and we need to meet their time restraints in order to gain their interest.

Non-verbal / Non-written communications deal more with the way we conduct ourselves; how we dress; and how we interact with others. This communicates, in-part, who we are and what we stand for; do we believe in what we are doing? Actions speak louder than words!

No matter which method you use to communicate, the important thing is to keep the lines of communication open! Also, remember that you can also use more than just one method to communicate, and most importantly, be positive in everything you communicate.

By assignment of the Most Excellent Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masons, with the gracious permission of the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Michigan, the Grand Chapter has launched a program called "The Masonic Heritage Medal". This award is known as the Lewis award in other jurisdictions. The Son will receive a medal and the father a pin to wear on their jacket.

Ancient lodges perpetuated the symbolism of "Lewis" by recognizing the significance of a Mason's son following the Masonic Direction of his father, thus becoming a "Lewis" Mason.

We have replaced that designation with our own recognition which we have chosen to call the Masonic Heritage Medal, assigning the same prestigious symbolism to our recipients as sons of Masons in early times.

This award is free of charge and will be presented by a current or Past Grand Officer of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Michigan.

Recipients must meet the following outlines:

Both fathers and sons must be masons in good standing Step fathers and step sons must both be masons

Grandfathers and Grandsons must both be masons

Both Fathers and sons must be present at the time of presentation

Must have an application filled out and turned in to the Grand Chapter

#### The Origins of St. Patrick's Day

St. Patrick's Day celebrates the Roman Catholic feast day of the patron saint of Ireland. St. Patrick died on March 17, 461. But did you know that he wasn't even Irish?

Patrick's birthname was Maewyn. He was born in Roman Britain. He was kidnapped into slavery and brought to Ireland.

He escaped to a monastery in Gaul (France) and converted to Christianity. He went back to Ireland in 432 as a missionary. While Christianity had already taken hold in the country, tradition has it that Patrick confronted the Druids at Tara and abolished their pagan rites, making Christianity more widespread.

Patrick became a bishop and after his death was named Ireland's patron saint. Celebrations in Ireland were understated though. When the Irish emigrated to the U.S., they created the bigger celebrations and parades known today.

Eighteenth century Irish soldiers who fought in the Revolutionary War held the first St. Patrick Day parades. The celebrations became a way for the Irish to connect with their roots after they moved to America. Fun Facts:

The shamrock: According to legend St. Patrick used the three leaf clover (or shamrock) to explain the Trinity.

**Dyeing the river green:** The practice of dyeing the river green started in Chicago in 1962, when city officials decided to dye a portion of the Chicago River green.

Corn beef and cabbage: This is an Irish American dish. Irish Americans were so poor they could not afford certain meals. On St. Patrick's Day, the best meal they could afford was beef and cabbage. It became a staple for the holiday.

Since joining the ranks of the Royal and Select, I have heard on occasion, companions making inquiries and/or comparisons about our symbolism used in Cryptic Masonry.






"Officially", in Michigan we simply use the broken triangle and trowel. However, in some jurisdictions, the sword is incorporated into their logo. So what's the story with the sword? Good question.....

Curiously, the only mention that I've been able to find binding the use of a weapon while laboring in some sort of construction, is a scripture found in the Old Testament of the Bible, Nehemiah 4: 17-18 which states,

"They which builded on the wall, and they that bare burdens, with those that laded, every one with one of his hands wrought in the work, and with the other hand held a weapon. For the builders, everyone had his sword girded by his side, and so builded."



Judah was one of several provinces which was a large administrative unit within the Persian Empire during the 5th century BC. The capital of the empire was at Susa. Nehemiah was the cup-bearer to king <u>Artaxerxes II of Persia</u>, which was considered to be an extremely important official position.

At his own request Nehemiah was sent to Jerusalem as governor of Yehud, the official Persian name for Judah. As we all know, Jerusalem had been conquered and destroyed by the Babylonians in 607 BC, which transpires toward the end of the Super Excellent Master Degree. Nehemiah finds it still in ruins, and his task is to rebuild the walls and to re-populate the city, centuries after the carrying away of the captive Jews to Babylon.

He faces opposition from three powerful neighbors who plot to attack Jerusalem; the Samaritans (Sanballat of Samaria), the Ammonites (Tobiah the Ammonite), and the Arabs (Geshem the Arab), as well as the men of the city of Ashdod. Despite hostilities, Nehemiah manages to rebuild the walls, which necessitates the Jews working with weapons in their hands, and then purifies the Jewish community by enforcing its segregation from its neighbors and enforces the laws of Moses.

Much symbolism can be drawn from this allegory. Suffice it to say that no matter which is used, the great lessons taught and learned by those of the Royal and Select; Temperance, Fortitude, Prudence and justice, far outweigh any need to determine "to sword, or not to sword"!

#### GRAND COMMANDERS CORNER --- March Message

British philosopher and mathematician Bertrand Russell (1872-1970), in his defense for atheism, wrote in his book, *Why I Am Not A Christian*, and gave the logical conclusion to the atheist's worldview.

"That man is the product of causes which had no prevision of the end they were achieving; that his origin, his growth, his hopes and fears, his loves and his beliefs, are but the outcome of accidental collocations of atoms; that no fire, no heroism, no intensity of thought and feeling, can preserve an individual life beyond the grave; that all the labors of the ages, all the devotion, all the inspiration, all the noonday brightness of human genius, are destined to extinction in the vast death of the solar system, and that the whole temple of man's achievement must inevitably be buried beneath the debris of the universe in ruins. . . . Only within the scaffolding of these truths, only on the firm foundation of unyielding despair, can the soul's habitation henceforth be safely built."

This pitiful statement is as good as it gets for an atheist. This is not just sad, it is the epitomy of hopelessness, despair and irrationality. At least Russell stated the truthful despair of the atheist worldview. However, even Russell could not live consistent to his own worldview. He was involved in social movements to protect man from destroying the earth through nuclear weapons. I wonder why? Because, contrary to his belief that life was meaningless, his heart innately knew life was valuable and worth fighting for.

So next time you run into a atheist, instead of running from his rantings and attacks on Christianity, begin moving into the various fields of his irrationality with piercing questions revealing the failure of his worldview to offer explanations about life, meaning, value, and the universe. Something is fishy about his worldview and we should, with compassion and mercy, make him face the irrationality and logical conclusion of his position. As we do, offer to him the truth that God has given us the answers to the big questions of life, and He has done so with reasonable and coherent explanations.

As Christians, we have the answers to the big questions of life. We need not apologize or shrink back from sharing them. It is time we begin declaring those truths with humility and boldness. Let us lower the draw bridge and leave the safety of our ecclesiastical castles and take the truth of Scriptures to the masses in the marketplace!

#### When was Presidents' Day 2016?

It depends on where you are. Presidents' Day or George Washington's birthday? The common myth is that Washington's and Lincoln's birthdays, both in the month of February, morphed into one "Presidents' Day" in 1968 when Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act to create more 3-day weekends for federal employees and to stimulate the economy. The truth is that some states have since adopted the name "Presidents' Day," neither Congress nor the President has ever stipulated the name of the holiday observed as "Washington's Birthday" be changed to "President's Day." Each year, we officially observe Washington's Birthday on the third Monday in February. Ironically, the holiday can never fall on Washington's actual birthday, February 22d, because the third Monday will always fall before that date.

Adding to the confusion is the whole question of the actual date on which George Washington was born. In fact, he was born in Virginia on February 11, 1731. However, in 1752, Britain and all its colonies scrapped the Julian calendar, then in use, and adopted the Gregorian calendar. Washington's birthday was moved a full year and 11 days ahead to February 22, 1732.

So, what do we care what it's called? We care because this federal holiday honors the accomplishments of the man we know as "The Father of our Country." Celebrated for his leadership in the founding of the nation, he was the unanimous choice to become our first President. The holiday also has special meaning for those of us who are Members of the Military Order of the Purple Heart, because it pays tribute to the general who created the new nation's first military decoration for the common soldier, the Badge of Merit. To commemorate George Washington's 200th birthday in 1932, the U.S. Army created the Purple Heart medal, with Washington's likeness on its face, to recognize the sacrifice of soldiers who are killed or wounded on the battlefield. As with Memorial Day and Veterans Day, Washington's Birthday offers all Americans another opportunity to honor our nation's veterans.
