The array of symbols and ideas put forth in the first three degrees cannot be and are not duplicated in any further Rite of the Craft, but additional degrees give us glimpses into aspects of the foundational degrees that would otherwise remain hidden. The topics of the liberal arts, geometry, and architecture can be studied at universities and are available to everyone in our society today, but the characters that animate our degrees are another matter.

Where can one go to gain insight into our Grand Master Hiram Abiff? How do we ever encounter the sealing away of the secrets of our Craft? We hear about them being hidden, but what happened...? The answers to these and other questions are why I am glad to be a Cryptic Mason. The degrees seem to be showing more historical clues than before. In the Royal Arch, we discover a vault, and much of the writing about the Knights Templar and their excavating under the Temple Mount alludes to a vault... but more is reveled or hinted at in the three Council Degrees than before.

The Royal Master Degree points to the location, the Select Master Degree reveals the purpose and more in the sealing away of the secrets to which "future generations shall discover the right," and the Super Excellent Master Degree lets us see through the eyes of those who saved the secrets from the profane to ensure that light would endure unsullied until now. It draws me close to our Craft to think that I am part of a lineage that has been brought to light and will bring to light, in an endless march into the future. At some point the striving for perfection and the steadfastness in persistence toward that end gives us something special and knowing the personalities of the people of our degrees gives those who enjoy membership in the Council an additional framework with which to behold our amazing ceremonies in Freemasonry. It makes experiencing all the preceding Degrees richer and more vivid.

In Service's lecture, the new member is instructed to be of some service each day. Every day before the sun goes down, each Rainbow Girl can find a girl who needs their help. All of our Rainbow Girls are encouraged to perform that service. Whether it is opening a door for someone, helping one of their teachers at school, or being a listening ear. For the years 2014-2016, each girl had an opportunity to earn a free Pandora-style bracelet. Each of the seven colored beads represented 10 service hours. The combined total of service hours for the last six months of the project resulted in over 3,000 hours of service given by the Michigan Rainbow Girls.

Each of the Assemblies are encouraged to perform at least one act of service each month and many do more than one each month. This has talked about the girls and how they help others.
