The Triple Tau came into existence in October of 1995 when Robert R. Smith became Grand High Priest he believed that this was a method of informing the Companions of the State with what was happening, in a faster and uniform presentation.

It began as a quarterly publication and after a couple of years was published on a monthly basis for 10 months, not in July or August.

In 2002 Bob stepped down as the editor, replace by Jan L. Beaderstadt until he was removed in February of 2007 and I was directed to take over.

This is a responsibility which I assumed and have performed since that time. I remain the only member that has been involved in the publication since its inception, having submitted numerous articles per month, on many occasions prior to become editor. I have changed the format occasionally. Gone from 10 months to 12 months, with Grand Chapter in August instead of October, believing that it was important to get out as much information as possible prior to the Grand Session.

Several years ago I expanded it by inviting the Grand Council and Grand Commandery to contribute. I believe that it is important that we share and support each other.

What is the change that I mentioned? I will be stepping down from the editorship.

My replacement editor has not yet been named, although I believe I know who it will be. Please continue to give them the support necessary for them to continue with this publication.

Not sure which month they will take over, however, I will do everything I can to make it a smooth transition. The format may change, but I remain confident that the content and intent as originally established will be continued.

Sribe's Scratches

As most Chapter are preparing to go Dark in the next month or two, I hope you are thinking about attending the York Rite Grand Session. Wednesday August 17th is Grand Chapter, Grand Council the 18th and Grand Commandery the 19th. This year's Grand Session will be held in Bay City.

Another thing that some of you may want to think about is representing the Grand Chapter as a Deputy District Instructor, (D.D.I.). This is a great way to help reach out into the world of Royal Arch and assist those Chapters that may be having some difficulties. If you do have an interest in becoming a D.D.I. or are just curious, here are a few things you should know.

According to the "Red Book", to be eligible to serve as a D.D.I., "a Companion must have served as a High Priest and obtained the title of "Excellent". D.D.I.'s are appointed Excellent Companions who have volunteered their time to serve and represent the Grand Chapter. The Grand Chapter is always looking for interested Companions who would like to be D.D.I.s as there are often some Districts that do not have a D.D.I. or whose D.D.I. becomes unable to perform his duties due to a health issue. Remember though, there may be a lot of travel involved. D.D.I.s assist the Grand Chapter in areas such as; communication with the subordinate Chapters, not only carrying information from the Grand Chapter to your Chapter, but also making a formal visit with each Chapter prior to the date for election of officers. Along with his normal visits to the Chapters, D.D.I.s will also conduct a "School of Instruction" prior to January 31st of each year. The purpose of the "School of Instruction" is to practice all, part or a section of the Ritual and floor work of a particular Degree, assigned by the Grand High Priest. At another date, the D.D.I will also hold a required "Inspection" of the Chapters that he has completed a school with. An "Inspection" covers that portion of the work and ceremonies of the Chapter practiced during the "School of Instruction". It must be completed prior to April 30th.

Other duties of the D.D.I, are: secure such statistical information about the Chapters, that may be needed from the Grand Secretary or Grand High Priest; provide information to the Chapter about the programs being offered by the Grand Chapter; assist the Chapters in applying these programs or any other program that may help strengthen the Chapter.

D.D.I.s are paid for necessary expenses of their duties such as: mileage, to travel to his assigned Chapter and postage for any correspondence his Chapters may require. These expenses are paid upon proper receipt to the Executive Director. These expenses however, must be within the Budget allowances established by the Grand Chapter.

D.D.I.s are the eyes and ears of the Grand Chapter. Are you interested in serving as a D.D.I.? Please contact myself or the E.C. Lou Scott Executive Director of the D.D.I.'s,. You may also find more detail and information regarding the D.D.I.s in the "Red Book".

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

ROYAL ARCH BANNERS

Much difficulty has been experienced by ritualists in reference to the true colors and proper arrangements of the banners used in an American Chapter of Royal Arch Masons.

It is admitted that they are four in number and that their colors are blue, purple, scarlet

and white; and it is known, too, that the devices on these banners are a lion, an ox, a man, and an eagle. But the doubt is constantly arising as to the relation between these devices and these colors, and as to which of the former is to be appropriated to Each of the latter.

The question it is true, is one of mere ritualism, but is important that the ritual should be always uniform, and hence the object of the present article is to attempt the solution of this question. The banners used in a Royal Arch Chapter are derived from those which are supposed to have been borne by the twelve Tribes of Israel during their encampment in the wilderness, to which reference is made in the second chapter of the Book of Numbers and the second verse; "Every man of the children of Israel shall pitch by his own standard." But as to what were the devices on the banners, or what were their respective colors, the Bible is absolutely silent.

To the inventive genius of the Talmudists are we indebted for all that we know or profess to know on this subject. These mystical philosophers have given to us with wonderful precision the various devices which they have borrowed from the death-bed prophecy of Jacob, and have sought, probably their own fertile imaginations for the appropriate colors.

The English Royal Arch Masons, whose system differs much from that of their American Companions, display in their Chapters the twelve banners of the tribes in accordance with the Talmudic devices and colors. These have been very elaborately described by Doctor Oliver in his Historical Landmarks (11,583-97), and beautifully exemplified by Companion Harris in his Royal Arch Tracing Boards.

But our American Royal Arch Masons, as we have seen, use only four banners, being those attributed by the Talmudists to the four principal Tribes Judah, Ephraim, Reuben and Dan. The devices on these banners are respectively a lion, an ox, a man and an eagle. As to this there is no question, all authorities, such as they are, agreeing on this point.

But as has been before said there is some diversity of opinion as to the colors of each, and necessarily as to the officers by whom they should be borne.

Some of the Targumists, or Jewish biblical commentators, say that the color of the banner of each Tribe was analogous to that of the stone which represented that Tribe in the breastplate of the High Priest. If this were correct, then the colors of the banners of the four leading Tribes would be red and green, namely red for Judah, Ephraim and Reuben, and green for Dan; these being the colors of the precious stones sardonyx figure, carbuncle, and chrysolite, by which these Tribes were represented in the High Priests Breastplate. Such an arrangement would not, of course, at all suit the symbolism of the American Royal Arch banners.

Equally unsatisfactory is the disposition of the colors derived from the arms of Speculative Freemasonry, as first displayed by Dermott in his Ahiman Rezon, which is familiar to all American Freemasons from the copyt published by Cross in his Hieroglyphic Chart. In this piece of Blazonry, the two field occupied by Judah and Dan are azure, or blue and those of Ephraim and Reuben are or, or golden yellow; an appropriation of colors altogether uncongenial with Royal Arch symbolism.


We must, then, depend on the Talmudic writes solely for the disposition and arrangement of the colors and devices of these banners. From their works we learn that the color of the banner of Judah was white, that of Ephraim, scarlet; that of Reuben, purple; and that of Dan, blue, and the devices of the same Tribes were respectively the lion, the ox, the man and the eagle. Hence, under the arrangement- and it is the only one upon which we can depend – the four banner is a Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, working in the American Rite, should be distributed as follows among the banner – bearing officers:

- 1. An eagle, on a blue banner. This represents the Tribe of Dan, and is borne by the Grand Master of the First Veil.
- 2. A man, on a purple banner. This represents the Tribe of Reuben, and is borne by the Grand Master of the Second Veil.
- 3. An ox on the scarlet banner. This represents the Tribe of Ephraim, and is borne by the Grand Master of the Third Veil.
- 4. A lion, on a white banner. This represents the Tribe of Judah, and is borne by the Royal Arch Captain.

This month's offering for Cryptic Education is written by Sir Knight Richard W. Van Doren. This is part one of a series, and comes from the Grand Council of Massachusetts.

The History of Cryptic Masonry - Part One – Theoretical -The Legends

No one knows for certain where or by whom Cryptic Masonry originated. Like all of Freemasonry practiced today, there are prehistoric antecedents which we draw upon for the wisdom and teachings of the degrees. The term "Cryptic" is derived from the Latin Crypticus and the Greek Krupt meaning "an underground, hidden, vault beneath a temple, cathedral, or the chapel of a cemetery." The origin of the term "Cryptic Freemasonry" apparently lies with Rob Morris, Past Grand Master of Kentucky and influential Freemason of the 19th Century.

Prior to Jeremy Cross and John Barker, the degrees were separate and not connected in a body as they are now. The degrees' content is, for the most part, found in both the Scottish as well as the York Rites. To understand the history, we will relate information about three areas: legends and their origins; where, when, and by whom the legends turned into degrees; and early records leading up to the practice of the degrees in Adonairam Council today.

The legends all surround the loss of a great blessing which, in a future age, will be restored or recovered. This tradition is found in many parts of the ancient world including China, India, Egypt, Babylon, Persia, and Israel. Within the Judeo-Christian traditions, there is more than one telling of that legend, including more than one story of buried "treasure or wisdom."

Talmudic scholars relate that workmen preparing the foundations of King Solomon's Temple found a subterranean vault supported by arches and pillars which had been built to keep safe and hidden a "treasure" or "secret." Josephus relates in "Antiquities of the Jews" that the descendants of Seth buried two pillars of "wisdom" in Syria from the time of Enoch. These multiple versions of the origins of the lost wisdom would be echoed in the Christian Era.

The Symbolism

"In the beginning was the Word. And the Word was with God. And the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God." John 1:1. For the Christian era, the Lost Word is the Christ and all that He represents, love and the healing of the relationship with God. The search for the Lost Word becomes the search for the Holy Graal or the quest of the Knights for the Ark of the Covenant. For the Stuarts of Scotland and England, the Word represented the divine truth of the right of the Stuart dynasty. (More of that later). For the Masonic thinker of today, the Word is much more than that. As Hinman, Denslow, and Hunt note, "We have been told that the Word could only be communicated in the presence of Wisdom, Strength, and Beauty, and in the absence of one of these, the Word was lost. Here we have a symbol of one of the greatest truths of human life, namely that a partial development of a man is a one sided development and produces a deformed, imperfect character. The pillars of Wisdom, Strength, and Beauty represent the three phases of a man's character: his intellect, his will, and his feeling or sensibilities."

The Word which symbolizes the perfection of the man and of his soul cannot be achieved if there is not balance among the three. If a man has developed his will and accompanies it with finely developed sensibilities yet lacks proper judgment of his intellect, it will lead him down a pathway of potential destruction. Should he have the proverbial wisdom of Solomon, yet not be able to heed the call of mercy of the human heart, he may be capable of the most hideous of human cruelties, and should he have wisdom and human kindness, but be unable to stand up to the forces of life's tumult, where does that leave him in the end but a weak reed blowing in the wind? We are not, therefore, to lose sight of the end of our quest. We are told to persevere toward development of all three attributes, and we shall arrive, eventually, at that state of perfection which the Christian Mason would call a state of grace. Non-Christian Masons could call that state of "grace" efficiency of being, of maximum personal potential, etc. Because the loss of the Word is only temporary, it can and it will be recovered, and with the recovery comes all the attributes which were thought to be lost, the productivity and efficacy of work, the beauty and the constancy of fraternal affection, and the mutual support of the community of the Brethren.....

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GRAND COMMANDERS CORNER --- June Message The Importance of Vision

Native American tribes would send young men off on vision quests, so that for the rest of their lives they would know exactly what direction they were supposed to take.

There was great wisdom in this. Having a vision for one's life is essential. Without one, you end up drifting along in life instead of being driven by purpose towards the fulfillment of your goals. Men without vision feel as if unfortunate events absolutely blindside them–Why did I get fired? Why is my wife leaving? Why am I 30 and still living at home? How did I get in so much debt? *How did this happen to me!?!* Men without vision live only in the present, much like the grasshopper in the old Aesop's fable. When winter comes, they are caught unawares and left dazed and shivering in the cold.
