What is Royal Arch Research Assistance?

We all have heard "Do you support R.A.R.A.?", and we know it is the primary charity of the General Grand and Grand Chapter, but do you know what is Royal Arch Research Assistance? The Board of Directors at R.A.R.A. has chosen to support three areas of research funding in 2016-2017. First, there is Central Auditory Processing Disorder (CAPD) research out of the University of Arizona. Second, is the Hearing Foundation, and third, is Autism Speaks.

Central Auditory Processing Disorder is a type of hearing problem that is more common than most would expect. It is not that the person is hard of hearing, but more of an auditory perceptual problem. That means a person with CAPD may have good hearing, but bad comprehension.

Hearing Health Foundation (<u>www.hhf.org</u>) is the largest private funding resource of hearing research since 1958. Their mission is Research, Support, and Prevention. The Hearing Health Foundation has always kept research a priority, which led to cochlear implants today. They support improving the lives of people living with hearing loss, tinnitus, and other hearing impairments through outreach programs and education. By raising awareness of what can be done to prevent hearing loss the HHF have created the Safe and Sound program for companies that recognize the importance of protecting their employees and customers hearing.

Autism Speaks is the nation's leading charity helping children with autism. Autism is a developmental disorder that affects a person's ability to communicate and develop relationships, and which is often characterized by repetitive behaviors.

These are the three charities that make up Royal Arch Research Assistance, which is the main charity of the General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons International and the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Michigan. Howard Visser PHP Representative from Michigan to Western Australia January 27, 2017 <u>Trip to Western Australia 2016</u> Perth!

On October 4, 2016, Brother Jeff Sloboda, of Lisbon Crescent Lodge Number 329, and I flew the 4.5-hour flight from Sydney to Perth. We had another wonderful flight courtesy of Qantas Airlines. I can't say enough about the kindness and professionalism of the flight staff, making our flight's very memorable segments of our trip.

We were met at the airport by our host, Brother, and Companion Norm Taylor and his lovely wife Isabelle. Their hospitality and kindness made our stay a very enjoyable one, above and beyond the excellent new old friends of the Brother Masons we met on this part of the trip.

Due to the 3 hour time difference, it was time for a dinner when we arrived at their home in Hilton, Western Australia, a suburb of Perth. A beautiful lamb stew dinner was waiting for us when we arrived. There is no better way to get acquainted with new friends than over a steaming dish of stew.

Mid-morning on Wednesday, Norm drove us to the Grand Lodge Office, a newer facility shared by the Grand Chapter. We were warmly greeted while the Grand Master's office and the office of the Grand Chapter accepted our credentials so that we would be welcomed in any Lodge or Chapter we visited while there. We, at that point, got our first look at a Lodge/Chapter Room. It is set up similarly to American Lodge rooms, with some significant differences.

On first entering, you realize that the main entry door is at the Northwest corner of the Lodge. Looking straight ahead, in the North, is a large desk occupied by the Secretary and Treasurer of the lodge jointly. On the wall behind the desk is a large wooden frame, divided into 3 equal parts vertically. Each part is either covered by a pull-down shade or a pair of curtains, depending on the Lodge room you are visiting.

The next significant difference noticed as you look towards the East, is that there are two large benches on either side of the Master's chair, capable of seating several brothers. Then, there are chairs on either side of the Master's chair. A few steps in front of the Master is the Altar.

There is seating on both the north and south side of the Lodge. The Junior Warden sits in the South. And the Senior Warden sits in the Southwest corner of the Lodge at an angle. If there is an instrument, it is placed in the West. On either side of the Wardens, there are several chairs for their use, and the Deacons sit nearby each as well. Stewards are seated on the south, near the Wardens.

Our trip was made mainly for me to represent Michigan Royal Arch Masons at Grand Chapter. On Friday night, Norm and Isabelle took us to the Meet and Greet, a reception for the Grand Chapter officers and families prior to the Installation of Grand Chapter on the next day. It was held in a lovely room in Perth, and very well organized. Once again, Jeff and I were treated like visiting royalty, and everyone made us feel very welcome, in spite of wanting to talk about American Politics. We found that politics the world over have their own unique challenges. Australia is no exception.

I was especially intrigued to converse with Masons from the countries to the west of Australia. Rarer than in Michigan, the room was filled with Companions of every color, in very colorful garb, who were as interested in talking to us as we were to them.
