<u>Heritage Award</u>

By assignment of the Most Excellent Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masons, with the gracious permission of the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Michigan, the Grand Chapter has launched a program called "The Masonic Heritage Medal". This award is known as the Lewis award in other jurisdictions. The Son will receive a medal and the father a pin to wear on their jacket.

Ancient lodges perpetuated the symbolism of "Lewis" by recognizing the significance of a Mason's son following the Masonic Direction of his father, thus becoming a "Lewis" Mason.

We have replaced that designation with our own recognition which we have chosen to call the Masonic Heritage Medal, assigning the same prestigious symbolism to our recipients as sons of Masons in early times.

This award is free of charge and will be presented by a current or Past Grand Officer of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Michigan.

Recipients must meet the following outlines:

1. Both fathers and sons must be masons in good standing.

2. Step fathers and step sons must both be masons in good standing.

3. Grandfathers and Grandsons must both be masons in good standing.

4. Both recipients must be present at the time of presentation.

5. Must have an application filled out and turned in to the Grand Chapter.

The next afternoon, at a private boys' school, we were taken to the Installation of Grand Chapter Officers to serve Western Australia the next three years. As a Representative from Michigan, I was to be seated in the East. As usual, there was a huge line of dignitaries to be introduced, and lining us up in proper order was similar to herding cats. It was done eventually, however, and all that was left was the long wait in line while successive visitors were introduced. I was among the last to be introduced and, much to his chagrin, although I was announced as a visitor from Michigan, the Outgoing First Grand Principal welcomed me as the Companion from Canada. He made his way to me during the banquet later to apologize. I told him it was no big deal since we and the Canadians are all Americans anyway. It felt like another sign of the warmth of the people that he took the time to personally apologize.

Like any Grand East, the chairs were placed very closely together. In my row, the front row facing west to the right of the dais, the chairs were so close, that when we rose to greet a newly announced visitor, we had to do it together, as we sat shoulder to shoulder. Having never been in this particular situation before, and as a guest, I was very conscious of doing things "right". I found that the men I was sitting with were super relaxed, and made little asides as the afternoon went on. They helped me to relax and enjoy the beautiful ceremony of Installation of Grand Officers.

After the Installation, we adjourned to another room across the campus where our dinner was served in courses, with beer, wine or soft drinks. The various courses were served very well and efficiently. It was done slowly with no sense of hurry whatsoever, which, again, gave us the opportunity to get to know our Companions and their wives in a very relaxed manner. Following dinner, was a program presented by two very lovely ladies, with classically trained voices. American Lodges could follow suit.

The Lodge is run by Master Masons and opened in the first degree. As soon as the Lodge is declared open, the Senior Warden repairs to the Secretary/Treasurer's desk and, with a nod, directs the Secretary to open the shade on the first frame, which reveals a picture relevant to the First degree. The same is done in each of the rest of the degree openings. All the main business is handled in the First degree. If important to all members, a piece of business can be held over for Master Masons to deal with later. But the Officers seem to make the majority of decisions regarding the operation of the Lodge. Only the officers and Entered Apprentices are in the Lodge for that part of the meeting. Norm had to get a special dispensation so that we could sit in all three degrees and he could sit with us in the Entered Apprentice and Fellowcraft portion of the evening. When the minutes are read by the Secretary, the Master signs his copy of them, and the Senior Warden goes to the East, and hand delivers the signed minutes to the Secretary, who places them in his book. When all important business is handled, the Lodge is opened in the Secretary and Fellowcrafts are seated in the Lodge. If there is any business there, it is dealt with, then the Lodge is opened in the Master Mason degree.

Farewell Address

The looming future with its challenges to our fraternity will continue until we find an effective way to be relevant in a world that has descended into tribalism and groupthink. The threat manifests itself in a division amongst current leaders with those who want to bring the fraternity into the "instant gratification" age and those who want to stay true to our 'ancient' principals.

I am firmly in the latter camp, having long believed that Masonry is traditionally so far ahead of the times that merely 'keeping up with the times' was setting Freemasonry back 150 years! We have always been at the leading edge of mankind's march out of ignorance and darkness. So in order to get to where the 'world' is, would be stepping backward. To get to 'where the world is' would take away enough of our essence to render the fraternity into something different than it has been historically. At some point we will have softened our charge to our members to be upright and true that it becomes fuzzy enough to hide just what actually is true. The next step away from our foundation is that our tenets become movable and changeable.

When Truth and Virtue become relative terms that the Masons use as obstacle-cones on the way to their various membership objectives, we are in dire straits. With fewer members, fewer qualified leaders are available to lead the fraternity. Our membership has decreased to the point where every year it becomes harder and harder to find those willing to serve. No experience necessary! But what you do not know can really hurt you. Few going through our York Rite Grand Lines have the business background necessary to negotiate the litigious minefield that awaits a modern corporation – non-profit or otherwise. This puts our several organizations at risk of external audit from various State agencies and opens us up to internal lawsuits. It is my understanding the Elks had to start allowing women membership when they applied their by-laws unfairly.

If that is not a wake-up call, what is? Following our by-laws is not something we do universally - it should be- and that exposes us to all kinds of risk. It really is "the thing that you don't know" that can hurt you. As long as this condition exists we can't even address the bigger issues of our time.

Much of everything else that ails us will be manageable if we have our foundation solidly managed. The Companions of our state put up with the year to year vicissitudes in the Grand Line's requirements, let's make sure we keep the fraternal lights for all our Companions.

It has been a pleasure writing this article during my year as Grand Master of the Grand Council. Thanks for the opportunity. Thanks, also, to Jane Todd for her help this year, give her a "Thanks," the next time you see her for all the work she does as our editor!

Brain Games?

A 2017 study found that computer video games were as effective as brain-training games at improving thinking skills. Brain training has become a fashionable pastime in recent years, with claims that the activity can improve a person's memory, attention, focus, and multitasking skills. However, researchers at the University of Pennsylvania tested the popular Lumosity brain-training exercises on a group of healthy adults aged 18 to 35. They found no evidence that brain-training games are more effective than computer video games at improving cognitive functions.
