- 9. Work with the Grand Council and Grand Commandery through a New York Rite Membership Committee.

- 1. Opening in the Royal Arch Degree.
- 2. Closing in the Royal Arch Degree
- 3. The Reception of Grand Officers and DDIs.
- 4. Changing Degrees both down and up for the purpose of the Conferral of Degrees
- 5. Chapter Records
- 6. The Most Excellent Master Degree (beginning with page 75 line 16 through Page 78, line 40 and commencing again on page 79 line 18 through page 84 line 27.

This month, in idle conversation, with GHP McCray we were talking about titles people want to be remembered by and how they do not make the man (woman). Lou indicated, "My grandfather, a PHP of Saginaw Valley Chapter #31, told me once {or more likely, several times) trying to impress people with credentials is a fools errand. Those who you want to impress, won't be and those you do impress aren't worth the effort."

I then stated, "I agree with your Grandfather. Wise man was he not?"

Lou's response, "That he was, and a man of many talents. I knew him to be not only a Freemason, but also an operative mason, carpenter, electrician, plumber, roofer, surveyor, architect (he designed and built the house we are living in, among others), an electronics technician "he built radios from assorted parts, not Radio Shack kits) a HAM radio operator, and a philosopher. He was a hobo, riding the rails in his late teens and early twenties, then somewhere along the way he latched on to a job with Consumers Power Co. and during the depression he wound up supervising a crew rebuilding the generators in the dam along the Au Sable River. I didn't find out until recently that he supported my grandmother's sister and her family until her husband found work at Buick in Flint. Unfortunately, he died ... the year I graduated from high school. Had he lived a few more years, I have no doubt I would have joined the craft much sooner than I did."

That got me to thinking about my grandfathers. Both passed away before I was in high school. My maternal grandfather, visiting while up from Florida, gave me a pocket knife and told me that it was mine, as long as I used it properly. I still have the scar where I cut myself, down to the bone, just a short time later, but he *never knew* that I did it? My paternal grandfather lived only a short distance from us but we never visited, except for Thanksgiving. I now wish that I had known both of them better than I did. This is a saying which I have frequently said that I live by – Wish I could really attribute it to one of them.

In today's day and age there really is no good excuse, with the many ways that we have availably to us at little or no cost to the chapters, we really don't have a good excuse. The benefits that we can reap from it are greater than I can put in just one article. Two major benefits are membership retention and new members. Retaining your membership requires communication, today there are way too many things vying for your memberships time. Your members have to have a reason to come to a meeting and that requires communicating with them. Once your members return, you now have the opportunity to engage them for the wealth of information they have, that has not been tapped for some time. The one thing to remember is that it is equally important to listen, as it is to speak, if they feel that they are not being listened to or heard, you will more than likely not see them again.

All of the above fits right in with the Grand High Priest's program of "3 x 3" for the year. Wherein you have three of your members who have not attended in some time get them to return and attend three meetings in the year.

The program has no down side. Your chapter has three more members attending your meetings, which in turn gives the chapter more input for programs and ideas. The program does require a little work from the chapter in welcoming old members back, along with keeping the meeting flowing and relevant. Meeting agendas help keep a meeting on track and require just a little thought from the secretary and high priest, along with any member adding input to the secretary before he prints it, so all attendees have one to follow along. A short 5 to 7 minute program from the education chairman would add to the interest. I would also submit that a chapter adds a communication chairman to the list of committee officers. He would be the go to person for mass communication to members; most methods of mass communication today are much less costly than sending a post card to your members and with a little research he could find the one best suited to your chapter. With good communication: retention and expansion becomes much easier for the chapter.

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Today I want to do something selfish; I want to talk to you about your wills. It is very likely you have been putting off making a will because you haven't contemplated the day when the Supreme Architect calls you to the Celestial Lodge above. Maybe you think that the estate plan the state has produced for you is adequate and represents your wishes. You should know that everything does not go to your spouse if you die without a will; if you have adult children they could get as much as half of your estate.

We all have many Masonic mementos: books, regalia, pins. Often, the person who is assigned to wind up our estate doesn't understand the significance of these items or their value to other members of the Craft. This causes many valuable items to end up in junk shops, lost forever to Masonic historians. A proper will, selecting a personal representative who knows the value of all your belongings and how best to dispose of them, is extremely important. You can even instruct him/her to give them to a son or nephew who is a Mason and will appreciate the memorial to you.

If you would like to discuss your personal situation, please contact me, or your own attorney. Every estate is different and requires special knowledge and understanding. A simple will is very inexpensive, although it may not fit your desires completely. We can also prepare living trusts and patient advocate forms for more complex estates. I hope that I will be hearing from you in the near future.

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#### The Importance of Working Relationships on Freemasonry

Hopefully, you will take the time to read my article "Masonic Philosophy, Ritual and Understanding Universal Spiritual Principles". That article provides insight into how our philosophy and ritual can have a significant impact on the life of any freemason willing to learn and apply its principles. It's my belief that with study, practice and adoption of our precepts every freemason can develop a better understanding of the Supreme Architect of the Universe, improve self- understanding, and strengthen his comprehension of the relationship between God and man. This current article was written with the purpose of extending that foundation and is best identified as "The Importance of Working Relationships in Freemasonry". As it's the ritual that develops the inner qualities of the freemason, so in like manner it's our masonic interactions that determine (good or bad) the growth and development of our institution. In my opinion, leadership and membership are the key elements that determine the success of any masonic body past, present and future.

Companions, whether subtle or overt, the behaviors we demonstrate are instrumental in conveying values, guiding strategy, and inspiring passion and interest. When positive leadership is practiced, the effect is far more powerful than merely attempting to get a Masonic brother to comply with attendance (by calling him on the phone), feeding him some fabulous meal or pressuring him to take an interest in masonic philosophy. For the good Masonic leader positive actions consistently tell the story not only of who he is, but of the behaviors our fraternity values. When you convey and believe in a shared and meaningful purpose, in time our Masonic brethren will follow the good example, it's a storyline which has been written throughout the history of our fraternity. So let's move forward leaving behind all the rationalizing and turn towards more practical considerations and absorb what is known/what can be applied from social psychology then revitalize the organization we have sworn allegiance to:

- The most important characteristic, of a good masonic leader is he decides and declares his intent to become the head of one of our masonic bodies. It's that point in time, when he decided he could provide others with a vision of the possibilities, direct the course of future events and inspire others towards personal growth. Successful leaders choose to lead and recognize the undertaking they aspire for treating it with upmost respect. They exhibit a unique blend of charisma, vision and character traits that attract people to follow.
- Good Leaders have vision. They share a dream and direction that other people want to share and follow. The vision of leadership is manifested in the actions, beliefs, values and goals of the masonic group. The vision must:
- 1. Clearly set fraternal direction and purpose;
- 2. Inspire loyalty and caring through the involvement of all the Companions/Brothers
- 3. Display and reflect the unique strengths, culture, values, beliefs and direction of our fraternity;
- 4. Inspire enthusiasm, commitment and excitement for the philosophy, ritual or Masonic activities
- 5. Help the membership realize that they are part of something bigger than themselves
- 6. Challenge people to outdo themselves, to stretch and reach.
- The ability to inspire Companions/Brothers to reach new heights of personal performance and fraternal success is a skill that our masonic leaders need. Passion, purpose, and meaning help make a masonic leader inspirational. In addition, the ability to communicate that passion, purpose and meaning helps establish the inspirational culture of our fraternity.
- 1. The inspirational masonic leader feels passionately about the vision and mission of the organization. He is able to share that passion in a way that enables others to catch it. The nature of the vision is critical for enabling others to feel as if their fraternal work has purpose and meaning.
- 2. The inspirational leader listens to the people in his Masonic organization. Talking to members about your passion is not enough. To share meaning you must allow the ideas and thoughts of the membership to shape the vision, mission, and goals. No one is ever one hundred percent supportive of a direction they had no part in formulating.
- 3. To experience inspiration, people also need to feel included. Inclusion goes beyond listening; for real inclusion, members need to feel intimately connected to the actions and process that are leading to the accomplishment of the goals.
  - If you expect anyone to follow they must feel confidence in the direction in which the leader is headed. The companions/brothers need to be enabled and empowered to do their part in accomplishing the agreed upon objectives. If progress towards accomplishing goals ceases, the leader takes responsibility to analyze the problem he doesn't search for people or external factors to blame. In contrast, the good Masonic leader excels at creating opportunities to provide rewards and recognition.
  - 1. Pay attention to all the companions using common courtesy.
  - 2. Listen to what all the members of the fraternal group have to say.
  - 3. Use powerful, positive language in your interaction with others.
  - 4. Give Companions/Brothers verbal credit for contributions.
  - 5. Put praise in writing through recognizing and applying for the various Masonic honors

Thus far we have considered the effects of leadership on our institution, however very little has been said about the qualities of good masonic brothers, those willing to commit their hearts and souls to achieve the goals of the fraternity. Almost every Masonic leader in one way or the other owes his success to these loyal brothers. Without their help no leader

can achieve success. Thus, behind the success of every great Masonic leader is the support, hard work and dedication of the members associated with that organization. Without the support and commitment of these masonic members the birth of even great personalities like George Washington, Marquis de La Fayette, Napoleon Bonaparte, Simón Bolívar, Benito Pablo Juárez, Dr. José Rizal and so many others would have been unimaginable.

I also believe that many other leaders who could have become as great as the ones mentioned above, miserably failed and did not rise because of the membership they had. It's no doubt that we will always need excellent leaders to take us into the future, but we also need dedicated brothers to help these leaders reach our goals. These Masonic members need to possess certain qualities:

- Masonic brothers should understand and accurately comprehend their leader's vision. They must also commit themselves to support that vision. One difficulty which at times crops up in this regard is conflict between the members and a leader's vision. To reduce this tension members should as much as possible align their vision with that of their leader's. They must own the leader's vision and take it on themselves to make it happen.
- Masonic members can either be like fuel providing energy or roadblocks creating hurdles for the efforts of a leader. Good brothers however help the leader to succeed, have a winner's mentality and derive pleasure form the leader's success.
- Most masonic leaders base their decisions on the information provided to them by their brothers. If this information is accurate and honest it will lead to good decisions. Conversely, in-accurate and dishonest information will lead to terrible decisions. It is also necessary to mention that all information provided to a leader by a mason may not be good news or pleasant. At times certain information will be upsetting but a loyal brother must forewarn the masonic leader and need act as their sounding post.
- Sometimes when faced with difficulties even great masonic leaders lose hope-during which times the brethren should help them by reminding and reassuring that success is possible. It is a fact that all human beings are capable of doing anything but only those succeed who possess the can do attitude. It is equally true that a person's altitude is determined by his attitude. As such companions/brothers must possess a positive and a can do attitude. Learning, the ability to understand one's limitations, the courage to unlearn negative ideas/beliefs and the desire to acquire new knowledge, skills, and information is yet another quality necessary for masonic brethren.

Masonic leaders set visions of a better organizational future and the brethren are tasked to help create conditions for realizing them. The critical role brethren play in the rise or fall of any masonic leader necessitates that all members must have the qualities of a good mason. Are you a leader or a loyal member? If you are a masonic leader raise loyal brethren with good masonic qualities. If you are a member and possess good masonic qualities always remember that "GOOD MASONIC MEMBERS MAKE GREAT MASONIC LEADERS". Now we have reached the end of yet another article, it's up to each reader to decide if I am correct in my hypothesis that what plagues us is not a variety of external factors (which have always existed) which we can never control but rather our internal factors that each one of us has the power to change and once channeled can revitalize the craft that we have all sworn allegiance too. What kind of Freemason do you aspire to be?

It is a duty which we owe to our Companions of this order, that the application of every candidate for admission should be examined with the scrutinizing eye, so that we may always possess the satisfaction of finding none among us, but such as will promote, to the utmost of their power, the great end of our institution. 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# The Equilateral Triangle, the Broken Triangle and the Isosceles Triangle

We are first introduced to two of these mathematical terms in high school geometry. However it is not until we become Royal Arch Masons, a Royal Master and Select Master that these three geometric shapes truly become meaningful symbols.

We were first introduced to the meaning of the equilateral triangle in the Royal Arch Degree. The lesson is reinforced in the Select Master Degree. If you do not remember, go to page 77 of your ritual book.

We are taught the meaning of the broken triangle only in the Royal Master Degree (page 27). Page 27 of what you ask? Page 27 of that small purple book that fits neatly into your jacket pocket and on the cover has the word Michigan embossed in gold color and a broken triangle with a trowel.

Every time we attend our blue lodge and witness a MM degree every Royal and Select Mason should immediately think of the Royal Degree, specifically page 27, as well as Scene 3 of the Select degree (page 59). Does your heart beat a little faster and stronger during a MM degree because you have chosen to become a Royal and Select Mason?

I ask you to think about this question, is the broken triangle in the Royal Master degree (page 27) the same shape as the equilateral triangle described in page 77 in the Select Degree?

Companions, if high school geometry seems like a distant memory, an isosceles triangle is a triangle that has two sides of equal length....read page 27 for that "ah-ha" moment.

Now look at this symbol available in Microsoft Word:  $\Delta$ . Yes, an isosceles triangle yet with another meaning.  $\Delta$  is the first letter for the Greek word meaning different. In mathematics and science we have adopted the symbol  $\Delta$  as the symbolic representation for change in value.

Can the allegorical story in the Royal Master Degree be asking us to think beyond the exemplification? Does the allegory of the Royal Master ask us to apply those precepts we first learned in the fellowcraft degree? Is there a meaning beyond the meaning of the meaning that we should embrace change...the broken triangle, the delta  $\Delta$ ?
