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<u>"GREETINGS FROM THE GRAND EAST"</u>

Greetings Companions,

It's been a very busy month since our last issue. The last 9 days of September, there was something happening almost every day; my own chapter's Stated Convocation on the 22rd, my birthday on the 24th, (not a masonic event but still of some importance to me), a trip to Buffalo, NY for the Joint General Grand Chapter & General Grand Council Triennial from the 25th to the 30th. Starting in October, there was the reception for the DeMolay State Master Councilor, Josh Lampar on the 4th, then on the 5th I attended a Long Range Planning Committee meeting, next from October 7-9 was a visit to Independence OH to attend the Ohio Grand Chapter Session. With Lady Kristi and me in Ohio were the Grand King, REC Donald Galway & Lady Sherry, the Grand Captain of the Host, REC Rich Hitch, and Past Grand High Priest, MEC Jerry Vann. On the way home from Ohio I paid a call on Lansing Commandery #23 to let the members know that Capitol Chapter #9 is in a very precarious position and to see if the Sir Knights who are also members of the chapter might have some suggestions to try to save the chapter from extinction or consolidation (they didn't). This was followed up by the HRAKTP and KYCH on Saturday, Oct. 11. Then there was the reception honoring the presiding officers of the Grand Chapter, Grand Council, and Grand Commandery on the 12th. On the 13th Lady Kristi and I met Ann Fairchild in St. Ignace and Ann & Kristi left to take Ann to her winter home in Florida while I continued to Marquette to visit Marquette Chapter #43 that evening. I stayed in the area overnight and visited Negaunee Chapter #108 on the 14th. Then it was home for a couple of days and a return to Marquette to attend the Valley of Marquette Scottish Rite Reunion on the 18th. Coming up for the week of the 20th, there is Surrise Chapter #74 in Alpena on Monday, a return to Lansing and Capitol Chapter #9 on Tuesday, Dennis Brawn York Rite College #65 in Grayling on Wednesday, on Thursday, Sunrise Council #418 AMD in West Branch, then on Frida

The General Grand Chapter and General Grand Council Triennial was a memorable experience, not just for the sessions but for the special events as well. On Friday there was a tour to the American side of Niagara Falls and Saturday a tour was offered of historical sites around Buffalo. On Friday evening Columbian Council #1, the Mother Council of Cryptic Masonry, conferred the Super Excellent Master Degree following a buffet dinner. On Saturday evening Most Excellent Edmund D. Harrison, General Grand High Priest, sat in the East for the conferral of the Royal Arch Degree in Ancient Form with a table lodge between sections of the degree. On Sunday morning, many of us walked about a quarter of mile from the host hotel to the Erie Canal where MEC Harrison and other dignitaries reenacted a scene from the dedication of the opening of the canal. At the original dedication in 1825, the then General Grand High Priest as well as New York state governor, Most Excellent Dewitt Clinton, poured a keg of water from Lake Erie into New York Harbor, symbolizing "The Wedding of the Waters" joining the Atlantic Ocean with the Great Lakes. For the re-enactment, water from New York Harbor was poured into the Erie Canal near the spot where the canal ends at Lake Erie, and I believe they used the original keg.

The Erie Canal was of great importance to the Upper Great Lakes and mid-west because it provided an easier path than overland for settlers to travel west and for crops, lumber, and other goods to travel to the East Coast and overseas. Cities like Chicago, Detroit, and Buffalo became hubs for commerce. The Erie Canal played as big a role in the development of the Upper Great Lakes during the first half of the 19th century as the transcontinental railroad did in the west during the second half.

The General Grand Chapter was opened on Sunday afternoon with legislation and the election of officers being put off until Monday. On Monday a proposal was approved to increase General Grand Chapter per-capita from \$1.00/member in North America to \$2.00/member beginning in 2016 and another increase to \$3.00/member in 2018, with other jurisdictions outside North America being more, much more. Another proposal to end the pre-paid life member program was postponed until the next Triennial Session. The measure was not proposed in due time and would have required a unanimous vote to pass, which it not have.

The election of officers followed the conclusion of other business. Most Excellent Louis E. Bartrand of Oak Harbor, WA was elected to the office of General Grand High Priest, MEC James H. Hodge of Richmond, IN (and a plural member of North Branch Chapter #138) was elected to the office of General Grand King, and MEC Steven G. Tiner of North Little Rock AR was elected to the office of General Grand King, and MEC Steven G. Tiner of North Little Rock AR was elected to the office of General Grand Scribe. Our own MEC Larry Inscho PGHP was as appointed as Deputy for the East Central Region and also was installed as General Grand Royal Arch Captain. MEC David Dossette PGHP was appointed as General Grand Chapter Ambassador to Michigan. The Grand Council of Royal & Select Masons of Michigan opened for the General Grand Council Assembly on Tuesday. They were a little shorthanded so a few of us from the Grand Chapter were pressed into service. The Grand Council companions did a fine job with the opening, especially David Boring, the Most Illustrious Grand Master, and they were very forgiving of any errors we Grand Chapter guys may have made. I will leave further discussion of the General Grand Council to MIC Boring with the exception of mentioning the wonderful memorial service they did for George Sellars with a special acknowledgement noting the passing of Ken Chandler. It was absolutely beautiful.

In conclusion, I would like to thank everyone who attended our Joint York Rite Presiding Officers' Reception in Bay City. Kristi and I are grateful for the opportunity to get together with some of the friends we have made over the past several years, have a good time with a nice dinner, have a few stories told about us, true or not, and good company. I realize we may have made a few breaches of protocol and not introduced a few people who should have been introduced, and did not get the chance to personally greet everyone, but please forgive us. We only get to do this once, so we don't get a lot of practice.

Chapter Membership Retention and Restoration

1. Chapter Fellowship

- a. Have a dinner or dessert before or after your meetings
- b. Monthly breakfast or dinner (also a great fundraiser)
- c. Visit other Chapters or Blue lodges (it's where the new members are)
- d. Participate in community events, such as, fundraisers, volunteer activities, etc.
- 2. Capitulary Education
 - a. Every Chapter should have an Education Officer. The Education Officer should share any new and/or useful information at each stated meeting as part of the proceedings.
 - b. Hold Degree practice at least once a month
 - c. Make sure each officer has an Officer's manual to reference what is expected for the position he holds.
 - d. Take time to study the degrees individually to understand and learn the meanings behind that degree. The better one understands the degree, the better mentor one will be for new members.

3. Membership

- a. Establish a Membership committee. The committee should consist of 4-5 members.
- b. Establish a relationship with a Blue lodge. Become "that person" Blue lodge members go to for information.
- c. Create social networking accounts, such as, Face Book, Twitter, Website, etc. Make sure to use the sites and keep content current.
- d. Get Active. Chapters will NOT keep or gain members if all we do is a business meeting. New members want some kind of purpose of membership.
- e. Host a dinner that includes nonmembers, their ladies, family and friends (see also fellowship)

4. Communication

- a. Know your audience
- b. Use email, newsletters, regular mailings, and phone calls for Chapter events.
- c. Use Face Book, Twitter, etc. Use a Website. Keep it simple and current.
- d. Texting is popular among younger members.
- e. Include other Chapters and lodges in your area of your events. It's a way to build relationships and network.
- 5. Future Planning
 - a. Chapters should have a Planning committee. Include officers of the moving line, excluding the HP.
 - b. If you have no plan, then you are planning to fail.
 - c. The plan should consist of one year to five year goals.
 - d. Track your goals and modify your plan as needed.

First President?

Who was the first President of the "United States"? Was John Hancock president before or after Washington? (answer at end) I'm sure that George Washington was your best guess. After all, no one else comes to mind.

But think back to your history books. The United States declared its independence in 1776, yet Washington did not take office until April 30, 1789.

So who was running the country during these initial years of this young country? It was the first eight U. S. presidents. In fact, the first President of the United States was one JOHN HANSON. I can hear you now John who? John Hanson, the first President of the United States.

Don't go checking the encyclopedia for this guy's name - he is one of those great men that are lost to history. If you're extremely lucky, you may actually find a brief mention of his name.

The new country was actually formed on March 1, 1781 with the adoption of The Articles of Confederation. This document was actually proposed on June 11, 1776, but not agreed upon by Congress until November 15, 1777. Maryland refused to sign this document until Virginia and New York ceded their western lands. Maryland was afraid that these states would gain too much power in the new government from such large amounts of land.

Once the signing took place in 1781, a President was needed to run the country. John Hanson was chosen unanimously by Congress (which included George Washington). In fact, all the other potential candidates refused to run against him, as he was a major player in the revolution and an extremely influential member of Congress.

As the first President, Hanson had quite the shoes to fill. No one had ever been President and the role was poorly defined. His actions in office would set precedent for all future Presidents.

He took office just as the Revolutionary War ended. Almost immediately, the troops demanded to be paid as would be expected after any long war, there were no funds to meet the salaries. As a result, the soldiers threatened to overthrow the new government and put Washington on the throne as a monarch.

All the members of Congress ran for their lives, leaving Hanson as the only guy left running the government. He somehow managed to calm the troops down and hold the country together. If he had failed, the government would have fallen almost immediately and everyone would have been bowing to King Washington.

Hanson, as President, ordered all foreign troops off American soil, as well as the removal of all foreign flags. This was quite the feat, considering the fact that so many European countries had a stake in the United States since the days following Columbus.

Hanson established the Great Seal of the United States, which all Presidents have since been required to use on all official documents. President Hanson also established the first Treasury Department, the first War Department, and the first Foreign Affairs Department. Lastly, he declared that the fourth Thursday of every November was to be Thanksgiving Day, which is still true today.

The Articles of Confederation only allowed a President to serve a one year term during any three year period, so Hanson actually accomplished quite a bit in such little time.

Seven other presidents were elected after him:

- 1. Elias Boudinot (1782-83) 2. Thomas Mifflin (1783-84)
- 3. Richard Henry Lee (1784-85)
- 4. John Hancock (1785-86)6. Arthur St. Clair (1787-88)
- 5. Nathan Gorman (1786-87) 7. Cyrus Griffin (1788-89)
 - All prior to Washington taking office in '89.

So what happened? Why don't we hear about the first eight presidents?

It's quite simple - The Articles of Confederation didn't work well. The individual states had too much power and nothing could be agreed upon. A new doctrine needed to be written - something we know as the Constitution.

And that leads us to the end of our story.

George Washington was definitely not the first President of the United States. He was the first President of the United States under the Constitution we follow today.

And the first eight Presidents are forgotten in history.

YOU HAVE TO BE A LOVER OF HISTORY TO APPRECIATE THIS!!

It took EIGHT years for us to establish a successful government. There you are - another lesson in U.S. history.
