Aesthetically, however, they do much more. Bookends neatly (and often artistically) provide visual symmetry for the books on display. In doing so, they draw more attention to the row of books, and give the impression that these books are special and to be admired." <u>Andrew Dlugan</u> – Six Minutes, Speaking and Presentation

Bethel 74 Evart will be providing "Birthday Cake Kits" to their local food pantry, as a lot of low income families cannot afford to have a birthday cake, and this is something that is overlooked when pantry donations are made.
