

My name is Eric Zervos, and I am the current State Master Councilor of DeMolay in the jurisdiction of Michigan. Last time, I wrote a brief explanation of DeMolay and its seven precepts. Now, I would like to discuss a bit about our history. The name DeMolay is derived from the great hero and martyr Jacques DeMolay, who was the last Grand Master of the Knights Templar. While he was Grand Master, the Knights Templar were accused of treason by King Phillip of France. DeMolay and his three preceptors Geoffrey de Charney, Godfrey de Goneville, and Hughes de Peralde were condemned to life imprisonment. After 13 years of torture and brutal persecution, he still refused to give up the location of the rest of his brothers, their treasure, and the secrets of the Templar Order. The King was so fed up with their refusal however that during one of their hearings the King demanded that DeMolay and Geoffrey de Charney be burned at the stake. The fact that Jacques DeMolay was able to face such harsh persecutions for such a long time and still never betray the trust that was reposed in him by his fellow brothers sets an example for all of us to follow.

If you wish to see a dramatization about Jacques DeMolay and his final moments, we perform the DeMolay Degree where we show a depiction of DeMolay's and his preceptors' final hearing. State degrees have been planned throughout the term, so I hope to see you there.
